# Peru Trip 2008

At the end of May through the beginning of June, Hope For Tomorrow with medical team of seven professionals and nine volunteers left Buffalo to return for the second year to donate surgery and medical care in Iuliaca, Peru at the Carlos Monge Hospital. Upon arrival there were several hundred patients and their families lined up in the corridor in

the hospital for screening, all hoping to become surgical recipients. Twenty-nine candidates were chosen and received cleft lip and palate surgery by Dr. Meilman and cataract surgery by Dr. Anthone. Dr. Huebschmann, a Niagara Falls anesthesiologist, administered anesthesia for all the surgical cases. Registered nurses Karen Carlo, MariLou Peters, Janice Vosburgh, and Physician Assistant Sara Martineck assisted the Doctors. Karen Carlo and Jan Vosburgh have traveled on previous Hope For Tomorrow missions. Dr. Rice, from Niagara Falls, performed consultations on wound care also at the Carlos Monge Hospital. While the team was in Iuliaca, we met Yolanda Quispe Mamani who was badly burned in a fire ten years ago and we have made arrangements to bring her back as this years Hope For Tomorrow recipient. We also had the pleasure of being greeted by Hope For Tomorrow recipient Moises who has completely recovered from his surgery last

year at Kenmore Mercy Hospital. He was proud to show the group his home where he is living with his brother.

The volunteers on the mission were Antoinette Andolina, Stan Coleman, Katherine Gallivan, Janet Long, Brian Rusk, - and Michele Straeck, along with siblings Jenna and Andrew Gage, children of the late Dr. Gage, who spent part of their summer college break traveling with the group. On the way back to the United States the group made a schedule stop in the Galapagos Islands where unexpectedly the team was asked to correct a cleft lip on a three month old baby boy. The local operating room had to be converted to accommodate the infant and the surgery was successful. The team was thanked by P. Michael McKinley the US Ambassador to Peru, and Leopoldo Mora the mayor of Santa Cruz, Galapagos Islands. To date, Hope For Tomorrow has operated on over 1,500 children worldwide.


#### Yolanda Quispe Mamani






